

Off-street car parking is plentiful (120-plus spaces), but access to/from is poor and direction signage is pitiful. Retailers appear to have little grasp that there is a poph'shop facility, free for fifteen or so minutes. There is a school of thought that the High Street should be pedestrianised, at on certain days of the week, or in the evenings. A lot of thought needs to go into this because the footfall is driven by convenience traders and if their trade suffers, they'll reduce there house, this damaging footfall, hitting impulse purchases, and the few destination outlets that draw from afar. Street markets seem to be popular, but I'm unsure if any reliable data has been compiled to establish whether they bring new people onto the High Street etc. and whether permanent traders feel any benefit. Some "guerilla gardening" takes place around the town which may reduce the weeds, but planters which enhance The Square, the area outside the museum, and by Back Lane car park would improve the appearance. The Town Council's planters at the junction of New Road/Sheinton Street and Smithfield Road/High Street are a disgraceful waste of taxpayers' money. They are large and are designed to have exuberant flow and isplays, not the leftover bedding plants that the supplier can't sell. 3. 




